
#### CASTLE IN THE COUNTRY BED AND BREAKFAST INN, ALLEGAN

This rural 1906 Victorian mansion beckons couples to 65 wooded acres about halfway between Kalamazoo and Holland. Choose from romantically named rooms (such as the Romeo and Juliet Suite), most with fireplaces and whirlpool tubs for two. Stay in and treat yourself to breakfast in bed, a couple's massage, chocolates and a picnic basket for two. Venture out for a snowshoe walk along 3 miles of trails in the woods, or a horse-drawn wagon or sleigh ride. It's a short drive to top wineries, breweries and restaurants like Salt of the Earth (Fennville) and Food Dance (Kalamazoo). Both specialize in fresh local fare.

#### INN AT BAY HARBOR, BAY HARBOR

This Petoskey-area getaway recalls an elegant vintage lakefront resort with recently renovated rooms, each with a box of local Kilwins chocolate-covered cherries. Sleep soundly but not too late, or you'll miss the breakfast buffet at The Sagamore Room. Go skiing or snowboarding at nearby Boyne Highlands Resort and Bovne Mountain Resort, then recover with The Spa's 90-minute Northern Luxury treatment (featuring warmed Petoskey stones). For dinner, the Vintage Chophouse and Wine Bar offers classic ambience. For a bit of boutique shopping, explore Petoskey's Gaslight District or the Village at Bay Harbor via a complimentary shuttle.











#### THE HOMESTEAD, GLEN ARBOR


Escape to this laid-back resort's two hotels, rustic lodge and historic inn next to Sleeping Bear Dunes National Lakeshore. Skiers head to Bay Mountain for beginner-friendly slopes and Lake Michigan views, while cross-country skiers and snowshoers follow trails to the dunes. Enjoy an upscale dinner at Cafe Manitou, the on-site restaurant with gorgeous sunset views. Or plan an indoor picnic for two with grab-and-go items from country store Cavanaugh's. The Spa Amira pampers with steaming stones and towels.

#### THE HARBOR GRAND HOTEL, NEW BUFFALO

Ben & Jerry's 24/7 sounds sweet, even in winter. That's one of the perks at this boutique retreat in southwest Michigan's Harbor Country, where it's a five-minute walk to the snow-covered Lake Michigan beach. If the ice cream gives you goose bumps, warm up with a massage, dinner at the Terrace Room (featuring a fireplace and cushy chairs) or evening s'mores. Guest rooms with fireplaces and whirlpool tubs kindle romance.

#### GRAND TRAVERSE RESORT AND SPA, ACME

Whether you nestle into the main hotel, the sleek glass tower (dine at Aerie Restaurant and Lounge with views at the top) or an outlying condo, you might be tempted to add another day to your trip at this property a few miles east of Traverse City. Snowshoe, ice-skate and cross-country ski on the grounds, or even keep your golf swing sharp in heated bays. At the spa, warm up with a couple's massage, body wraps and hot stones. Hit the health club for a hot tub soak or sauna.



#### MGM GRAND DETROIT, DETROIT

For a luxurious stay, spend some downtime at this urban showcase with 400 modern rooms. Spring for in-room champagne and chocolate-dipped strawberries, rejuvenate at the IMMERSE spa, splurge on a meal at Wolfgang Puck Steak, and let the games begin at the casino. Cap the night in the AXIS Lounge.

#### JW MARRIOTT, GRAND RAPIDS

Loll in luxury bedding or a thick bathrobe as you weigh the self-indulgent options at this high-rise with views of the Grand River. Book a spa treatment, dine on French cuisine at six.one.six, or kick back with a cocktail at Mixology, the cosmopolitan lounge. Within walking distance, find museums and a multitude of craft breweries.

#### GARLAND LODGE AND GOLF RESORT, LEWISTON

A woodsy theme permeates the rustic log structure. See it aboard a horse-drawn sleigh ride or trek through the 3,000-acre property on cross-country skis. The Nordic Nibble event offers stops at five food stations (weekends in February). Cozy up to the stone fireplace and dine on wild mushroom chicken at Antlers Bar and Grill.





# merry and bright Whether you're looking for trendy gifts or the spirit of Christmases long ago, head for these festive holiday hubs.



# CAMPUS MARTIUS PARK, DETROIT

This vibrant gathering spot sits in the heart of the city's business district.

**CELEBRATE** Downtown's winter wonderland officially kicks off with the tree-lighting ceremony mid-November and runs through early January. Throughout the season, enjoy outdoor skating, pop-up shops and food trucks.

**BROWSE** A dozen or more vendors turn the lobby of the 1001 Woodward building into a marketplace for jewelry, fashions, food and home decor.

At Cadillac Square's Europeanstyle market, sellers occupy dozens of glass stalls. The End Grain Woodworking Company features goods made with wood from old Detroit buildings.

The scent of holiday greenery from Greystone Gardens wafts through the Capitol Park market.

TAKE A BREAK Refresh with cocktails, snacks and desserts from gastropub Central Kitchen + Bar in the Cadillac Lodge, a heated tent hangout furnished with couches, fireplaces and rugs.

#### DOWNTOWN ROCHESTER

Storefronts covered with holiday lights create a show for shoppers.

**CELEBRATE** More than a million glowing lights drape downtown businesses during the annual Big, Bright Light Show! (November 19-January 1). See the spectacle from 5 p.m. to midnight; most shops are open until 9 p.m.

**BROWSE** Hunt for decor flourishes—like Eiffel Tower-









inspired wine glasses—among the Frenchflavor flea market finds and vintage pieces at **The Urban Merchant**, which looks like an indie cousin of Anthropologie.

Pick up comfy apparel bearing a distinctive "mi" logo at **mi State of Mind**.

Flatter your feet with hard-to-find brands from **Sole Sisters**, an indie shoe boutique.

**TAKE A BREAK** People rave about the ribs and the s'mores brownie dessert at **The Meeting House**, known for its neighborhood feel.

# OLD TOWN, LANSING Shop this historic district a mile north of the Capitol.

**CELEBRATE** Back-to-back events kick off the holiday shopping season. Local artists and owners greet customers with sweets, treats and hot beverages. Find special deals during **Small Business Saturday** (November 24) and **Holiday Hullabaloo** (December 1).

**BROWSE** At the Old Town General Store, create a gift basket with Michigan-made goodies, such as chocolate-covered cherries.

Pop into Cravings Gourmet Popcorn for versions of the crunchy snack. The holidays bring flavors like candy cane, coal (really, it's black cherry and licorice) and butter rum.

TAKE A BREAK Meat BBQ coddles carnivores with Southern-style pulled pork, smoked chicken wings and nachos. The restaurant appeared on Food Network's Diners, Drive-ins and Dives.

#### CROSSROADS VILLAGE AND HUCKLEBERRY RAILROAD, FLINT

A charming, re-created 19thcentury village welcomes visitors.

**CELEBRATE** Thousands of lights twinkle as carolers and costumed villagers mingle with visitors at **Christmas at Crossroads Holiday Magic.** Shop for stocking stuffers, take a train ride or spin on a vintage carousel.

#### TAKE A BREAK Mill Street Warehouse

serves a buffet with favorites such as chicken and ham, green beans, and mashed potatoes. Save room for a build-your-own sundae. PHOTOGRAPHS: (SHOPS) COURTESY OF GREATER LANSING CVB, (CONDUCTORS) JOHNNY QUIRIN, (VILLAGE) EE BERGER









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# DOWNTOWN HOLLAND Hip offerings mix with Dutch heritage.

**CELEBRATE** Join the procession as Sinterklaas, atop his white horse, leads families to the tree-lighting ceremony during the **Sinterklaas Eve Celebration** (December 7). Artisans and food vendors fill open-air booths in the Eighth Street Marketplace on weekends during **Kerstmarkt** (November 17–December 8).

**BROWSE** A perk for downtown shoppers: heated sidewalks (no snow!). Century-old **Holland Peanut Store** tempts with fresh-roasted nuts and hand-dipped chocolate treats.

Shop for gifts at **Karla's Place**, where DIY succulent potting stations share space with cheeky "Wish You Were Beer" apparel.

**TAKE A BREAK** Breathe in the chocolate aroma at **Kilwins** and taste Mackinac Island fudge. An outdoor fireplace warms hands.

#### GREENFIELD VILLAGE AT THE HENRY FORD, DEARBORN

The living-history village transforms into the world of Christmas past.

**CELEBRATE** Follow lantern-lit paths through 80 acres of living history at **Holiday Nights**. It's a magical evening

as carolers gather under lampposts and costumed performers reenact holiday moments. Ice-skate, take a horse-drawn wagon ride, shop and tour historical homes decked for the season. A fireworks display caps each evening.

**TAKE A BREAK** Pop-up tents and stands sell hot chocolate, chestnuts and other savory snacks. Kids love hot dogs and mac 'n' cheese from the Village Pavilion, while A Taste of History restaurant serves a traditional turkey dinner, soup and dessert.

#### STEAM RAILROADING INSTITUTE, OWOSSO

A historic train transports riders to a winter wonderland.

**CELEBRATE** Ride the **North Pole Express** to the Village of Ashley's Country Christmas festival, where kids meet Santa. The historic *Pere Marquette 1225* **steam locomotive**, which inspired the one in *The Polar Express*, pulls the train as passengers sip cocoa.

**TAKE A BREAK** Food carts serve grab-and-go sweet treats, such as elephant ears and deep-fried Oreos. For a sit-down dinner, try hot dogs and pretzels from the **Burger Barn**, lighter fare at the **North Pole Express Cafe**, soup and bread at the **Hobo Kitchen**, or dinner and drinks at **Gus' Eatery and Saloon**.





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#### LUGE

Novice sliders reach speeds up to 30 mph down an 850-foot luge track at Muskegon Winter Sports Complex, one of only four tracks in the nation. (Jake Hyrns, an alternate on the 2018 Winter Olympics team, trained here.)



#### SKIING

Pizza and French Fries—cute names for beginner skills taught at Crystal Mountain in Thompsonville. Slopeside lodging offers quick access to terrain parks and almost 60 ski runs: advanced skiers take on ungroomed trails.



#### **EXTREME TUBING**

This is no ordinary sledding hill. At Treetops Resort in Gaylord, a towrope takes you

up the mountainside before your exhilarating ride down the steep hill. Families can tie multiple tubes together. Reservations are required.



#### **ZIPLINE**

Soar up to 25 mph—hands-free, if you're brave—above the ski runs at Boyne Mountain in Boyne Falls. The nine-line Zipline Adventure tour begins at the top of the mountain and descends 50 stories as riders zip through the trees.



# wanna play?

When you're ready to chase away the winter blues, find indoor and outdoor options for your perfect family getaway.



#### SUPER SPLASH

A countdown begins when fearless riders enter the Super Loop Speed Slide at the indoor water park, Zehnder's Splash Village in Frankenmuth. Then a trap door opens on this splashy thriller, dropping you four stories and into a giant loop.



#### **COOL CAVE**

Rub a 1-foot-by-1-foot salt chunk as you enter the re-created cave at the Outdoor **Adventure Center in Detroit.** You can also walk behind a

waterfall, watch fish, step inside a beaver lodge, stand in an eagle's nest and paddle a kayak down a simulated river.



#### FLIGHT SIMULATOR

Strap in before taking control of your fighter jet at Kalamazoo's Air Zoo. As pilot, you'll decide whether to do stomach-flipping barrel rolls as you fly a stunt plane or go head-to-head against robots or enemy aircraft.



#### CAR CREATOR

How fast can you assemble a Model T? Find out at Henry **Ford Museum of American** Innovation in Dearborn, when you use bolts and wrenches to attach a part before turning the hand crank to start it up. (By 1927, Ford cranked out a Model T every 24 seconds!)



# Jalen Rose

The college hoops legend, former NBA star and broadcaster sends a love letter to the Motor City, his hometown.



In the Fab Five's first game starting as a unit,

they scored all of Michigan's points against Notre Dame.



**DETROIT RUNS JUST AS DEEPLY AS** BASKETBALL THROUGH JALEN ROSE'S VEINS. The ABC/ESPN analyst grew up in the Motor City, electrifying Southwestern High School fans on the basketball court in the early '90s with future NBA ballers Voshon Lenard and Howard Eisley. In Ann Arbor, he became part of one of college basketball's most legendary lineups: the University of Michigan's Fab Five, the powerhouse team that also included Detroit's Chris Webber. (Despite public squabbles among the teammates, speculation is flying about a 25-year reunion during the current hoops season.)

Jalen spent 13 seasons in the NBA and eventually graduated with a communications degree. You'll still see him on TV: He appears on Get Up! with Mike Greenberg and Michelle Beadle, ESPN2's Jalen & Jacoby, and ABC's NBA Countdown. And there's still a good chance of spotting him around Detroit, where he has founded a public charter high school and frequents local restaurants and shops. You also might glimpse his wife, ESPN's Molly Qerim—the two married quietly last summer.

Jalen sat down with Pure Michigan to share some Detroit love and give his top picks for going out in the Motor City.

#### So you're still a Detroiter.

Detroit is always going to be my home. My mother and grandmother live here, and the public charter high school I created, Jalen Rose Leadership Academy (JRLA), is here. I travel to the East Coast to do my ESPN shows, but Detroit is where I call home.
























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# What do you do in your free time?

I love music, and one of my hobbies is being a DJ.
But for visitors, I tell people they must go to the Motown
Museum. It's in Berry Gordy's original "Hitsville U.S.A."
building and shows the history of Motown.

#### What else?

I'm into fashion and like to go to Shinola for their accessories. It's an international chain, but their flagship (and first) store is in Detroit. And because my last name is Rose, I like to give people gifts of roses. Byron's Flowers is my go-to.

# Why did you start the academy?

Because I want kids in Detroit to have a quality education. I already had the scholarship going, but a motivating factor was that Detroit was closing schools and building prisons. Along with my cofounder, Michael Carter, we wanted to know how we could make a substantial impact for students, and it was the 9–16 program. (The tuition-free high school guides more than 400 scholars grades 9–12 and through college.)

#### $\biguplus$ How's that going?

Almost all JRLA students graduate, and all graduates go to a university—a few attended my alma mater, the University of Michigan at Ann Arbor—a college or junior college, a trade school, or into the military.

#### What's behind your media success?

I'm one of the few athletes that actually went on to work in the field I majored in, so I had a lot of practice before I started on TV. The secret ingredient for me is being knowledgeable on many subjects, not just sports, but also politics, education, pop culture and current events. I try my best to be well-versed.

#### What other projects are you working on?

Last year I did a sitcom, Jalen vs. Everybody, which was shot as a pilot for ABC, but they didn't pick it up. However, ESPN liked it and ran with it. ESPN does all sorts of content, but a sports-related sitcom, that was a first for something like that. The show got a lot of eyeballs, so I may continue through Amazon and Netflix, but nothing's been finalized.

#### **MY 5 FAB PLACES TO EAT**

I consider myself a foodie; I do cook, but I prefer to eat out. Here are some of my metro Detroit favorites:

- 1. For a great steak, **London Chop House**. It's legendary, as it's been downtown for decades (opened in 1938, but closed for a period, re-opening in 2013).
- 2. I love eating at **Sweetwater Tavern.** It's famous for its marinated chicken wings. And it's a juke joint. You walk in and play the jukebox that's always going.
- 3. **The Original Pancake House.** Not IHOP. The Original, in Grosse Pointe Woods. I don't just go for breakfast—I'll go any time for the silver dollar pancakes.
- 4. **Fishbone's** in Greektown is a classic. It's a New Orleansstyle place famous for seafood gumbo and Cajun food.
- 5. Eating at **American Coney Island** is a Detroit tradition. You don't just get a hot dog. You get a Coney Island Hot Dog with Chili Cheese Fries. It's the entire experience. One bite, and it's all over your wrists and forearms.

#### LOCAL FLAVOR PERCH TRY IT AT MAMA LU'S ORDER TACOS PESCADOS

Lake Superior perch stars at this 40-seat Front Street taqueria. Pearlescent fillets become tacos pescados as they're flashfried, folded in made-to-order tortillas and dressed with orange-jicama slaw, mint and house-made hot sauce.

# LOCAL FLAVOR **ARTISAN CHEESE**TRY IT AT **LEELANAU CHEESE**ORDER **RACLETTE**

While savoring a slice of melty raclette or spreadable herb-laced fromage blanc,

visitors watch cheese-makers John and Anne Hoyt transform Leelanau County cow's milk into nutty washed-rind wheels of fromage, an art they learned in the Swiss Alps.

# LOCAL FLAVOR **SOUR BEER**TRY IT AT **JOLLY PUMPKIN**ORDER **BAM NOIRE**

The beer wizards at Jolly Pumpkin have a stack of awards for Bam Noire, a sour barrel-aged dark farmhouse ale that smacks of dried fruit, coffee and cacao. Pair a cold snifter with the local bison sloppy joes or sample the farmhouse

French onion soup made with rich bone broth, Bam Biere and caramelized onions.

#### LOCAL FLAVOR BRUNCH

#### TRY IT AT **RED SPIRE BRUNCH HOUSE**ORDER **RED VELVET PANCAKES**

Red Spire Brunch House, tucked into Grand Traverse Commons' twisty brick corridors, takes its name from the jagged Victorian peaks of the former 19th-century state hospital campus that is now a shopping, dining and gallery destination. The cafe's signature dessert-for-breakfast comes in the form of airy red velvet pancakes drizzled with a cream cheese glaze.

The champagne-style, small-batch sparkling wine ages for two years in the bottle. It effervesces with aromas of golden apple and fresh-baked bread.

# LOCAL FLAVOR HERITAGE APPLES TRY IT AT TANDEM CIDERS ORDER A HARD-CIDER TASTING

In the Tandem cellar, cider-maker
Dan Young crushes and co-ferments wild
gribbles, red crabs and table apples like
Northern Spy from local orchards. Tandem
Ciders' lineup of seven distinctive hard
ciders runs the spectrum from the slightly
sweet Smackintosh to racy, bone-dry
The Crabster.

#### LOCAL FLAVOR

#### FARM-TO-FORK COOKING

TRY IT AT THE COOKS' HOUSE ORDER A COOKING CLASS

Each month, Chef Jennifer Blakeslee draws upon her network of local farmers and her love of travel to teach intimate, handson cooking classes. Participants travel to the farmers market and transform fresh produce into two to three dishes, which could include aromatic South Indian curries or spicy Thai noodle bowls.

# LOCAL FLAVOR WINE PAIRINGS TRY IT AT BLACK STAR FARMS ORDER A FRIDAY DINNER

A three-course dinner paired with wines captures the bounty from Black Star Farms' vines, fruit trees, gardens and pastures. Private tours at this state-of-the-art Old Mission winery wind past percolating steel fermenters and into the aging caves, where you'll find sleeping barrels of bold reds while enjoying tastes from charcuterie boards.

Don't hibernate, get out on the trails in towns like Bay City, Birch Run, Chesaning, Frankenmuth, Midland, and Saginaw.



Television and movies fuel a lot of the exhibits. Big hits last year: Attendees could record an auto sing-along (hi, Carpool Karaoke!) to share on social media. Or they could star in a TV commercial by hopping behind the wheel of a classic Mustang and racing another driver to a parking spot.

#### HANDS ON

Top automakers let visitors check out new vehicles. Climb behind the wheel of a glossy sports car—or design one. At last year's Chevy Virtual Dynamics Lab, novice engineers created cars using an Etch A Sketch-like machine. At Ford, attendees built Lego people before snapping pics.

#### **VIRTUAL REALITY**

This is where innovators show just how big they're dreaming. In 2018, Ford's City of Tomorrow experience took guests on a virtual five-minute roller-coaster-like ride. Passengers experienced a few close passes with tree branches and buildings while soaring over an earth-friendly futuristic utopia.

#### SENSORY-FRIENDLY DAY

The show designates one day for audiences with autism and sensory sensitivity. Doors open at 8 a.m. (an hour early) for visitors to experience the show without flashing lights, monitors and loud noises.

#### ON THE MOVE

In 2020, the North American
International Auto Show moves to
early June. This change lets companies
expand exhibits outdoors with a larger
presence in and around downtown
locations such as Campus Martius Park.



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

NOKOMIS LEARNING CENTER Call ahead to arrange a storytelling experience at this Okemos center. Tour the museum, library and indigenous artwork gallery. Exhibits, events and educational programs, such as language classes, also await.

ANDREW J. BLACKBIRD MUSEUM Learn to make dream catchers from crafters in the historic Harbor Springs home of renowned Ottawa tribe leader and historian Andrew J. Blackbird.





### **DAY 1:** FRIDAY

SHANTY CREEK STEEPEST RUN Red cheeks. Gulping for air. Icy lungs. Wow, I just held my breath the entire way down Kingdom Come. It took less than a minute, and when I notice I'm still white-knuckling the poles, I realize it's been awhile since I've gone that fast. Dang, it's good to be home.

It's a strong start to my three-day homecoming tour, the kind of "micro adventure" I've built my travel approach around. On this one, I'll burn only a single vacation day while hitting some of my favorite resorts in the Mitten's northwest corner: Shanty Creek, Boyne Mountain and Nub's Nob.

My plan is simple: ski all day, spend the night, wake up early and drive 40 minutes max to the next resort. Wash, rinse, repeat—from Thursday Skilng AT YOUR night through Sunday.

TOP SPEED \_\_\_\_ I spend most of my morning bombing Kingdom Come and Shanty's other must-do frontside black diamond, Goosebumps. Later, I head to the backside to get my fill on blues and greens through dense stands of beeches and maples. The red lift is particularly nice this morning—a few inches of fresh snow blanket the ground and trees, and with no condos and few people, quiet reigns. It's a perfect contrast to the frontside's speed and excitement.

BEGINNER AND INTERMEDIATE RUNS

At day's end, I ride about 10 minutes on Shanty's complimentary shuttle bus to downtown Bellaire. Short's Brewing Company is a must-do for anyone visiting northern Michigan, but especially if you can get access to a ride. The brewery serves dozens of beers—easy-drinking, go-to beers like Locals Light and Bellaire Brown, or zanier selections with ingredients such as local cherries, bourbon and peanuts. There's also Bee Well, a meadery, and Mammoth Distilling within walking distance of Short's.

DESIGNATED -DRIVER=MORE IPAS!

Chris Hale, a Schuss Mountain and Shanty Creek Resorts exec, nailed it when he guipped that the Bellaire scene was "approaching cosmopolitan." All those legit dining and craft beverage choices (plus crazy-pretty scenery) are right there.

### DAY 2: SATURDAY

If Shanty Creek Resorts is winding up to cosmo, my next stop is fullblown there. Boyne Mountain Resort offers a slew of amenities, such as ziplining, fat-tire biking, tubing and um, spa-ing. Horseback riding? Yup. An arcade? You got it. But it's not amenities that make Boyne Mountain a must. It has enough acreage, heart-jarring steeps and terrain parks to keep any hard-charging skier happy for an entire season. So for a single day, I'm golden.

Fresh groomers, soft snow and a bluebird sky greet me as I take a few laps on the high-speed six-person lift, lapping Hemlock and McLouth, two of Boyne's (maybe even Michigan's) most fabled runs. Both offer views of Boyne Valley, and with east-facing slopes, they're perfect morning runs.

It's tough to rip myself away, but come afternoon, I know a trip to the resort's southernmost edge is worth the time and effort. Super Bowl. is a great place to carve big turns—especially on a powder day.

And while racing down wide-open groomers is never a bad time, nearby Dave's Glade fills my spoiled, tree-skiing, mountain-loving heart. Its perfectly spaced hardwoods are as close as I've gotten (in the Lower Peninsula, anyway; the Upper Peninsula's Mount Bohemia is another story) to the long tree runs I love out west. Both runs sit far enough from the high-speed lift to dissuade the crowds, but on a true powder day, this is where you find the locals.

IT'S A HUMBLE OPERATION THAT'S AS MOM-AND-POP AS THEY COME, AND THEY'RE ALL IN ON ONE THING: GREAT, WELL-GROOMED SNOW.

### **DAY 3:** SUNDAY

The sun comes up as I pull into the lot at Nub's Nob, my home hill. I learned to ski here between my dad's knees as a toddler, and when I became a teen, I got my first season pass here. Nub's is as no-frills as they come. Instead of a zipline, waterslide or hotel on site, you'll find a simple focus: dang good skiing.

The three frontside black diamonds—Smokey, Scarface and Chute—make up the area's most visible face. It would be a travesty to visit Nub's without skiing one of them, but I'm saving them. First, a little warm-up, right? Nub's is home to what is probably my favorite blue square in Michigan, Sno-Pro. The long, dogleg run starts with huge views of Boyne Highlands (just across the Pleasantview Valley from Nub's) and Little Traverse Bay. I especially love it on mornings when the corduroy is fresh. After a few wide, swooping turns, I'm treated to a calendar-worthy frame of the Nub's base area and day lodge.

I head to the green lift to get some turns on the frontside before lunch at the cafeteria. I lap Smokey a few more times (I can't get enough of its sustained speed and easy, no-skate access to the chairlift) and head to the orange lift, the southside of the ski area. Here I find the same peace and quiet as my first morning. The seven- to eight-minute ride to the top gets you to long, leisurely green squares through the hardwoods. The black and gray lifts access Pintail Peak. Its smattering of great blue squares and views of Little Traverse Bay make it another necessary experience.

By late afternoon, three days of sun and endless skiing have me wiped. Thankfully, the only après option available—and needed—at Nub's is Nub's Pub in the day lodge at the base of the green chairlift. I grab a Two Hearted Ale and settle on the porch to watch others ski the last hours of the day—a suitable Sunday ending for a three-day ski marathon. But I can't stop thinking: Maybe I could find the energy to head up Bayview. Because those sunset views would be totally worth it.

## **MOUNT BOHEMIA:** ITS OWN ROAD TRIP

If you're ready to trade a little more driving for a lot more snow, add a loop up to Mount Bohemia on the UP's Keweenaw Peninsula.

With an average annual snowfall of 300 inches, a 900-foot vertical drop, no grooming, and heavily treed runs (meaning, not beginner-friendly), it rounds out an ultimate ski road trip.

On Mount Bohemia, don't worry about getting lost—the best runs end at a road, where a shuttle bus picks up skiers to bring them to the base. Be prepared for a few laps in the bus.

New runs in the Outback drop into Outer Limits, which is good for fresh turns, whether it's a pow day or not. This remote backcountry boasts some of the deepest snow. No matter where you end up at Bohemia, its steep, rocky terrain will challenge any skiing ability. For those willing to spend a little more for fresh turns, Bohemia offers cat skiing. A snow cat (a machine with huge treads) delivers up to 20 skiers to areas inaccessible by a chairlift.

Cat skiing isn't the only new amenity. The base area has grown to include a hot tub and log-cabin lodge that houses a bar and sauna, though most of its facilities (cafeteria, sitting areas, bathrooms and ski patrol) are still housed in small, heated yurts.

### **BLUE ICE**

When conditions are just right, icy slabs stack up on shore near the Mackinac Bridge, which joins the Lower and Upper peninsulas. The ice isn't really bluelow temps and calm winds allow Lake Michigan's water to freeze slowly and evenly, creating a dense, bubbleless structure (similar to a glacier's) that absorbs light. Sunlight's red particles travel far into this type of ice, which scatters blue particles to make the aqua hue.

### **SNOWY GLOW**

For a great view of the aurora borealis, head north (the farther the better) on a clear night, when the light show can reflect off water. In Copper Harbor in the Upper Peninsula, Brockway Mountain provides panoramic views of Lake Superior's coastline.

### **CAPTURE THIS**

Your best shot to see the northern lights comes near the spring or fall equinox on a clear, moonless night at a northern latitude of at least 45 degrees. Shoot away from town and along the shore at a place like Hebard Park, just west of Copper Harbor, after midnight.

### **ICY FALLS**

Open year-round, Tahquamenon Falls State Park near Paradise in the UP draws visitors to the 50-foot-tall Upper Falls. It's a short walk (.3 miles) from the parking lot to the Upper Falls. The more adventurous can plan a wintry snowshoe trek. From the parking lot, the moderately difficult Giant Pines trail makes a 3.8-mile loop.

### CAPTURE THIS

In January, frozen spray coats the trees. Shoot from the handicappedaccessible overlook along the Upper Falls trail.





### **FROSTED LIGHT**


Fresh snow coats the icy shore around Point Betsie Lighthouse and Keeper's Quarters in Frankfort along Lake Michigan. Built in 1858, the still-operational light marks the entrance to the southern end of the Manitou Passage.

CAPTURE THIS Be ready to head out in adverse weather conditions such as high winds and snowstorms. In this photo, a snow squall instantly turned day into night.

uring a break in the action at a Michigan Tech hockey game, you might expect the Huskies Pep Band to be playing. But they aren't. They're singing.

At the tender age of three/ They threw me on my ear/ And there was nothing left for me to do/ But become an engineer.

To be sure, this is not pretty singing. It's an irreverent, throaty chanting that befits their trademark striped overalls and personalized hats. Before re-shouldering their instruments (a viola here, an accordion there), the band belts "Engineers" with grinning glee. It's a fitting celebration of their school—where engineers-in-training hone their craft in part by sculpting elaborate snow buildings during an annual winter carnival—and a sport that has laced together their community for generations.

Hundreds of mining companies converged on the remote Keweenaw Peninsula during an 1800s copper boom, as immigrants from 30-plus nations came to toil in the mines and raise families. Hockey soon slid down from Canada, a welcome diversion from the area's hard labor and thigh-high lake-effect snow. Casual local teams evolved into what's believed to be the first pro league anywhere, causing Houghton to label itself and its Dee Stadium rink as the Birthplace of Professional Hockey.

In Houghton and across the Keweenaw, outdoor rinks dot the landscape like Florida's backyard swimming pools. Kids here master walking and then strap on skates, with dreams of taking the ice for Michigan Tech. The Huskies turn out NHLers and Olympians at a brisk clip (the Vancouver Canucks' Tanner Kero is an alum) and will celebrate 100 years of Tech hockey in 2020–21.

### WELCOME TO THE SNOW SHOW

It's no surprise that hockey took hold in Copper Country and at a school first known as the Michigan Mining School, when the state created it to train engineers. The sport rewards the same qualities common in miners: grit, sacrifice, playing through adversity and taking pride in the





struggle. Hardiness runs deep in a place where the record low snowfall for a season was just shy of 7 feet. There's no way Houghton (population 8,000) could ever become a metropolis, any local will tell you, because there aren't many who can hack it through a Houghton winter.

Not in spite of the wicked weather but because of it, Michigan Technological University has staged elaborate wintertime carnivals since the 1920s. In January, student teams begin carving massive, intricate snow sculptures around town for Winter Carnival. Some cultivate free-range whiskers all winter for a beards competition, judged through public skits. And their breath whooshes in white puffs during carnivalized sports—human ice bowling (with a person on a saucer sled as the ball), snowy tug-of-war, heavy-booted snow volleyball and the Yooper

Sprint, a relay in which competitors wear a cross-country ski on one foot and a snowshoe on the other.

TOP Annual snowfall in Houghton averages more than 18 feet, meaning downtown stays Christmas-card pretty all season. BOTTOM People pull homemade sleds in human sled dog races.

Carnival-goers also can watch broomball matches, join a ski race, take a sleigh ride and warm up at a downtown bonfire. Stop into a Friday Ice Mass service, held in an open-air chapel that engineering students construct out of water and snow.

(Bundle up, and then add an extra layer—it's been so cold in past years that the priest's fingers have frozen to the chalice.) Then get over to MacInnes Student Ice Arena to cheer the Huskies' brick-wall defense and guffaw at the band, an ensemble so cheeky and shamelessly raucous that they got themselves banned from the Northern Michigan University football stadium. (The crime, according to the band: neutralizing home-field advantage.) Their spirit is conspicuous in a place where friendly, earnest reserve is more the norm. But at hockey games, Houghton classics like "No Beer!" will thaw even the most stoic fans:

In heaven there is no beer/ NO BEER! That's why we drink it here ... In heaven there is no snow/ NO SNOW! That's why we want to go.

### A WINTER WEEKEND IN **HOUGHTON**

WINTER CARNIVAL One of the largest annual winter celebrations in the nation, Michigan Tech's festival (February 6–9, 2019) features elaborate snow sculptures, shows, contests, races and outdoor movies. Most events are free and open to the public. The carnival closes with a torchlight ski parade.

### A.E. SEAMAN MINERAL MUSEUM

While in Copper Country, visit a 17-ton slab of the stuff at this museum on Michigan Tech's campus. A Great Lakes exhibit features greenstone, Petoskey stones (fossilized coral) and agates laced with copper bands. Marvel at an electric rainbow of specimens that fluoresce under black light.

THE HISTORY OF HOCKEY Inside Dee Stadium, a waterfront arena that bills itself as the Birthplace of Professional Hockey, the exhibit offers a look into the history of the favorite local sport. See a stick from the 1904 world championship team and learn about the league that was an NHL forerunner.

### **ROY'S PASTIES AND BAKERY**

A century ago, hardworking men toted golden piecrust pockets of meat and potatoes into the copper mines for lunch. Today, pasties are still a UP staple. Roy's serves them hot and hearty, with traditional fillings (including pork and rutabaga) or unexpected combos like turkey cranberry. For dessert, don't miss an almond Danish square.

AMBASSADOR Stained glass and historic gnome murals (moved to the building from a local brewery in the 1950s) festoon this family-owned restaurant that's been crafting pizzas from the same recipe for more than 50 years. Pies feature crisp-thin crusts; local Keewenaw Brewing Company beer is on tap.

SHERIDAN ON THE LAKE On the wooded shores of Portage Lake, find three suites and breakfast. Some mornings, enjoy a Finnish meal. Pannukakku has a sweet, creamy texture—part delicate custard, part oven-baked pancake. Or try thimbleberry jam spread onto nisu, a glazed cardamom bread. More then 10 miles of trails unfurl outside for hiking or skiing; a sunroom invites relaxation.

### **MAGNUSON HOTEL COPPER CROWN**

This 46-room hotel with indoor snowmobile parking sits about a mile and a half from Michigan Tech. Fuel up for the day with a free continental breakfast; wind down (and warm up) in the evening in a whirlpool and sauna.
